With the support of the TASN bursary award I was able to purchase a used 8-shaft Harris table loom (£350.00), bobbin winder (£85.00), two boat shuttles (£41.00) and put the remainder towards yarns. This was invaluable to the development of my final collection, and enabled me to independently produce two of the three pieces, when access to university facilities was not possible.

As a mature student with three children, the return to university has enabled me to identify, evaluate and establish my art practice; approach to process, material and technique; and values in regard to contemporary and contextual issues with confidence.



With the support of the TASN bursary I am now in the position to continue developing my weave practice after graduation,

upholding values formed around the environment, society and circularity; and continue research into the spaces we inhabit, and their significance to our emotional, mental, physical, and social health, healing and wellbeing.
